Leible's Concept

Outside and below my home and studio are the Andes Mountains.

But inside my home is a universal culture made up of many inspirations - The Divine Comedy, the Odyssey, Virgil, Jorge Luis Borges, Jung, Rodin, the poetry of the two Chilean Nobel laureates, Gabriela Mistral and Pablo Neruda, who both lived near my home and shared their poetics as unique theme and cultural treasure.

ANIMA MUNDI "This world is, in fact, a living being endowed with soul and intelligence, a unique and tangible entity that contains, in turn, all the living beings of the universe, which by their very nature are all interconnected" (Plato, Timaeus).

In this exhibition, I prefer the concept of "Anima Mundi" to the invasive and anonymous concept of "Globalization"

In my painting is everything that I am, as a necessary part of the structure of the Universe, my response and unique contribution to this reconnection with nature as a local artist, knowing that "the treasure is in the courtyard of my home".

From my mountain workshop in the Andes, I contribute to the universal "collective unconscious". I add my light to the millions of beings who live and work in their own way, invoking every morning:

Foreword

Looking at Leible's work feels like a contemplation of a new contemporary mythology.

Inspired by the surrounding landscape of the magnificent Andes, their mystic history and the power that they hold, both visually and physically, echo the spirit of the great poet Gabriela Mistral.

Leible is clearly captivated by the tales of Greco-Romans and the Gods of the ancients, who for centuries provided us with entralling myths and legends. The paintings seem to embody and reinvent the traditions of ancient oral storytelling while creating a visual tradition of their own.

Such is Leible's personal metamorphoses, telling us stories of the past and present. Some may have been born out of real events, and Leible breathes new life into the narratives, offering us layers of meaning so that gazing into Leible's pool you can almost see yourself, your own story reflected back.

Knowing the context behind artworks can enhance a viewer's understanding of the symbolism and content of the compositions. Sometimes we gain an understanding through art historical study, but in many cases we can also absorb these tales through popular culture. Leible offers us both in her astonishing rendering of the powerful beasts and the emotional fragility of the humans portrayed.

This is powerful large scale work. The use of charcoal and oil paint is direct and dynamically composed over huge naked canvases, they infuse and bind us to Mother Earth, creating an intrinsic connection between living things, a living Anima Mundi.

I love it.

Prólogo

Contemplar la obra de Leible es como contemplar una nueva mitología contemporánea.

Inspirada en el paisaje circundante de los magníficos Andes, su historia mística y el poder que encierran, tanto visual como físicamente, se hace eco del espíritu de la gran poeta Gabriela Mistral.

Leible está claramente cautivado por los relatos de los grecorromanos y los dioses de los antiguos, que durante siglos nos proporcionaron mitos y leyendas apasionantes. Las pinturas parecen encarnar y reinventar las tradiciones de la antigua narración oral, al tiempo que crean una tradición visual propia.


Así son las metamorfosis personales de Leibel, que nos cuentan historias del pasado y del presente. Algunas pueden haber nacido de hechos reales, y Leible da nueva vida a las narraciones, ofreciéndonos capas de significado, de modo que al mirar el estanque de Leible casi puedes verte a ti mismo, tu propia historia reflejada.

Conocer el contexto de las obras de arte puede mejorar la comprensión del simbolismo y el contenido de las composiciones. A veces lo entendemos a través del estudio de la historia del arte, pero en muchos casos también podemos absorber estos relatos a través de la cultura popular. Leible nos ofrece ambas cosas en su asombrosa representación de las poderosas bestias y la fragilidad emocional de los seres humanos retratados.

Se trata de una poderosa obra a gran escala. El uso del carboncillo y la pintura al óleo es directo y dinámico, compuesto sobre enormes lienzos desnudos, que nos infunden y vinculan a la Madre Tierra, creando una conexión intrínseca entre los seres vivos, un Anima Mundi viviente.


